Sayeesha's* family was in poverty and faced unending challenges every day. The responsibility of providing and taking care of her children fell on Sayeesha. She received no support from her alcoholic husband or her extended family. Finally she resorted to sex work in Kamathipura, Mumbai.

While working in the red-light area, Kasturi* and Sayeesha became friends. Kasturi had gone through similar challenges like Sayeesha. One day, Kasturi met with our staff and eventually moved out of the red-light area. She started helping the staff prepare meals for the children in our programmes. She introduced Sayeesha to us and encouraged her to take up the 6-month vocational tailoring course and the BA1 hair styling course. After a few months, Kasturi helped Sayeesha leave the red-light area as well. Now Sayeesha works in a beauty parlour and is financially independent. A good friend can also be a trailblazer and Kasturi was just that for Sayeesha.





Karthik and Diwakar are 9th and 10th grade students in Bayanganipalli village, Punganur. They are both from marginalised communities and have faced several challenges because of that. The children struggled to fit in at school and often wanted to guit because of the discrimination. We identified them and counselled them to join the after-school programme (ASP) at Potter's Wheel. Eventually, they started volunteering in community events and became a vital part of the change agent group.

Women were trained in acquiring various other skills like baking, jewellery-making, etc Praveena, a vocational tailoring student from Hallegudadhahalli, Bangalore says, "After joining the vocational tailoring programme, I learnt to stitch and now I am a dress designer. I have also learnt different life skills such as anger management, budgeting, working as a team, and being confident, which has helped in gaining my husband's respect and most importantly, it has helped me become financially independent. Now that I am earning, my husband even helps me with household chores!" Praveena wants to support other women in her community by starting a social enterprise and teaching them what she has learnt.



Suganya, one of our self-help group members from Basin Bridge, Chennai recently received an award for 'Young Women Creating Change in the Society' from One Life, a non-profit organisation. Suganya's husband and her children proudly cheered her on at this event which was held on Women's Day. Suganya was an excellent student in the jewellery-making training as part of our self-help group initiative. She learnt everything that was taught with major interest. As soon as Suganya completed this training, she began selling the products that she made and started training women at another non-profit organisation. This helped Suganya receive a decent income. Suganya says that this small-scale business has helped to elevate the financial status of her family. She is also a prominent member of Oasis India's health committee in Basin Bridge. This is the kind of change that brings the vision of Oasis to life - that is enabling individuals to become agents of change.

Mukthi Bike Challenge 2019 (MBC) began with 14 bikers, 6 from India and 8 from overseas. The bikers were accompanied by our staff and the Centre for Action street play team from Christ University, Bangalore. Our team travelled along the trafficking routes of Bangalore to Mumbai, creating awareness and conducting rallies in schools, colleges, hospitals and public places. In a week of creating awareness, we reached out to over 11,000 people and distributed pamphlets on human trafficking.

"I felt privileged to have been a part of MBC. If there is an opportunity again, I will definitely be there. This journey is something that you would never forget as it is beautiful on one hand but on the other, the reality of why we do it cuts deep."
